Board Member Steve Kohn: Committee on Downtown Homelessness Update

- Meeting was Held June 5, 2024
- Father Joe's Village
 - Offers meals, mail drops, health as a priority, parenting classes, family services, vocational assistance, and three vans that provide street health
 - They provide an estimated 4,000 services a day and about 1,000 services per night
 - Some unhoused individuals have degrees and skills but can't afford housing in San Diego
 - Housing insurance has become an issue; the price has jumped from 1M to 4M and could prevent additional affordable housing from being built
- Jewish Family Services
 - Six Safe parking sites for up to 300 cars per night
 - H-Barracks is a possible site for an additional 250 cars
 - Wrap-around services are easier to offer the newly unsheltered
 - 70% of individuals are unsheltered for the first time
 - 25% of unsheltered individuals are over 60 years old
 - Offers a 24/7 Hotline
- San Diego Housing Commission
 - Dashboard: Official San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC) Website
 - Oversees 53 homeless assistance programs, 13 in-house
 - LGBTQ+ shelter to open first quarter of 2025 w/ 45 beds
- Ketra Carter, Program Manager Homeless Strategies & Solutions
 - 51% of individuals housed without subsidy and diversion programs

- Sidewalk Vending Ordinance
 - Sixty carts have been impounded
 - Thirty Citations have been issued
 - Civil ordinance rule: vendors do not have to identify themselves to officers



- C Street Corridor Crime Suppression Efforts (in collaboration w/ Clean & Safe)
 - Four felony arrests (drug charges/fugitive warrants)
 - Individuals arrested for Fentanyl sales
 - SDPD focused on violent crimes, drug sales, property crimes
 - H.O.T. (SDPD outreach team) focused on quality-of-life issues
- SDPD Update
 - Police Chief Scott Wahl unanimously approved by City Counsel
 - Eight Captains to be promoted and reassigned on August 3, 2024
 - Smart Streetlights are now being used county-wide
 - SDPD childcare center has become a national model for police agencies across the country and is helpful regarding recruitment
 - Central division handles 22% of all radio calls received
 - SDPD survey top three community priorities
 - Theft/vandalism
 - Traffic
 - Homelessness
 - Due to Prop 47 SDPD is limited regarding enforcement
 - Pedi-Cab Ordinance
 - Safety issues
 - Noise levels
 - SDPD Bike Team in Gaslamp
 - Eighteen officers
 - Two sergeants
 - Staffing Shortages
 - SDSP is short over two hundred officers
 - Number of Officers 1988 vs. 2024
 - 1988 budgeted officers: 2,300
 - 2024 budgeted officers: 2,036

Guest Speakers: Pete Garcia & Beth Callender

- Bay to Park Paseo Update
 - 1.7 Mile Connection of San Diego to Balboa Park via Park Blvd
 - Park Blvd. has had significant investment
 - The character of the street changes as you move closer to Balboa Park
 - 5K Residents live within two blocks of Park Blvd.
 - 15K-18K Students within one mile
 - Tactical urbanism is the focus
 - Working with Brian Schoenfisch on permitting
 - Thirteen different teams are working on the Paseo
 - Most of the work done has been done pro bono
 - Sponsored by Downtown Public Spaces Foundation
 - 135K Raised



- Port of San Diego is the main sponsor
- Eleven of the thirteen installations are in place
- Tours take place on the first and third Saturdays of the month
- The Paseo has increased the foot traffic on Park Blvd. by 9%
- Fundraising in progress for the butterfly on the pedestrian bridge
- Phase Two: Interactive space within Balboa Park
- Most installations will come down in November

- The ordinance to ban amplified noise was approved
 - Code of conduct regarding pedicabs
 - The City of San Diego is looking to align their policies with the Port of San Diego
 - Pre-trip invoicing to avoid inflated prices
- Family Reunification Program
 - Top destinations are New York & Chicago
 - Demographics:
 - 2/3 are aged 25yr-35yr
 - 1/3 are children
 - 2/3 coming from the street
 - 1/3 coming from the shelters
 - There have been 513 unifications in the past year
 - Six-month follow-up is conducted
- Brian Schoenfisch update:
 - Balboa Park-San Diego High School connection
 - San Diego High School currently has a 99-year lease
 - Final report due this month
 - Working with John Nolan Parkway/Paseo Project
 - Sixth Ave bridge enhancements and freeway lids
 - Letter of Support from DSDP may be requested

 - Scott Wahl was promoted to serve as the City of San Diego's 36th Chief of Police on June 7, 2024
 - Robert Logan will be sworn in as the 19th Fire Chief of the San Diego Fire-Rescue Dept. on August 24th

- Prop 47 Reform Update:
 - DSDP has been involved in reform discussions for the past year
 - Prop 47 Reform is now known as Prop 36 and will be on the November ballot
 - State legislature has taken up an anti-retail theft legislative package
 - Prop 36 will deal with drug crimes, offenders, and rehabilitation
 - There will be some opposition to the new Prop 36 ballot measure

- C Street Corridor Safety/Outreach Collaboration (presented by Dani Garcia)
 - Clean & Safe, SDPD and MTS conducted walking patrols and enforcement
 - 33 Hotspot locations were identified in Gaslamp & City Center
 - Conducted a two-week humanitarian outreach approach
 - June 24th Morning unsheltered count: 77 individuals
 - July Monthly unsheltered count: 140 individuals
 - July 3rd Afternoon unsheltered count: 110 individuals
 - Outreach made contact with 617 individuals
 - 107 individuals accepted services
 - 30 individuals enrolled in unhoused care programs
 - 35 individuals enrolled in case management
 - Multiple citations issued on MTS property
 - Multiple citations issued for public right-of-way violations
 - EMS services and welfare checks were provided to multiple individuals
 - Four female individuals received shelter referrals
 - Multiple business visits were conducted
- Comic Con
 - Environmental Services Dept. to assist Clean & Safe with Comic Con cleanup efforts
 - Additional power washing and trash routes
 - Clean & Safe will conduct post-Comic Con inspection




Safety Tickets Generated July 1, 2024, to August 31, 2024







Unhoused Care Team Success Story:

A recent client began his experience of homelessness in San Diego in 2021 following a mental health crisis. Despite efforts to resolve his situation independently, he was unable to do so after three years of struggle. Upon learning about the Family Reunification Program, the client reached out with the hope of staying with his brother in Minnesota for a fresh start. The Family Reunification Team successfully arranged transportation for his journey to Minnesota. During a follow-up in early September, the client reported that he has secured employment at a powder coating company and is doing exceptionally well, attributing his progress to the support provided by the Family Reunification Program.




